9-1-1 USE IT, DON'T ABUSE IT!

Call 9-1-1 for emergency service

Fire

Crime in Progress

Medical Emergency

WHAT IS IT?

9-1-1 is the universal number for emergency response by police, ambulance, and fire services. It is available 24 hours a day.

WHEN SHOULD I USE IT?

Situations Where the safety of people or property are at risk. Examples of 9-1-1 emergencies include a fire, crime in progress, or medical emergency.

SUPPOSE I NEED THE POLICE BUT ITS NOT AN EMERGENCY?

If your complaint is not an emergency, dial 519 445-2811, the non-emergency number for the police. Use 519 445-2811 for anything that is not an immediate threat to life or property such as a parking complaint, a noisy party, or lost and found articles.

TIPS FOR USING 9-1-1

Remain calm and speak clearly. Identify which emergency service you require (police, fire, or ambulance) and be prepared to provide the following information:

What is happening?

What is the location?

What is your name, address and telephone number.

Please remain on the line to provide additional information if requested to do so by the operator. **DO NOT HANG UP** until the operator advises you to do so.

WHAT ARE THE DANGERS OF 9-1-1 PRANKS CALLS?

Prank 9-1-1 calls are a waste of time, money and can also be dangerous. If 9-1-1 lines or responders are busy with prank calls, someone with a real emergency might not get the help they need.

What To Teach Your Children About 9-1-1

Do your children know how to get help in an emergency?

teach your children how to get help in an emergency.

Teach your children their address and telephone number as soon

as they are able to learn. Keep the address and telephone number posted by all phones in case they are unsure.

Tell your children to answer all the emergency operators' questions and to stay on the line until they are told

to hang up.

Child Safety Seats Save Lives.

In Ontario, child safety car seat is required for all children up to age eight.

A properly installed child safety seat can reduce the risk of injury or death by as much as 75%

Car crashes are the number one cause of death for Canadian children.

Over 80 % of child safety seats are not used properly. Common errors include not tightening the seatbelt and harness enough, and not properly using the tether strap when required. You can make sure your child's safety seats are installed correctly by logging on to www.ontario.ca/smartlove for helpful tips and information.

LOCK IT OR LOSE IT!

In Canada, a vehicle is stolen every 3 minutes. That's close to 500 vehicles a day.

Unfortunately, you're footing the bill. As a policy holder, you are forced to pay for these criminal acts through your automobile insurance premiums.

And the first step in preventing automobile theft is to acknowledge that it can happen to you.

Tidbits to remember:

A professional can steal your vehicle in just 30 seconds—without the key.

Always roll up your vehicles windows, lock the doors & pocket the key.

Always park you vehicle in a well lit area.

Keep valuables out of sight.

Keep your registration and proof of insurance on you at all times. Don't leave in the glove box.

KEEP YOURSELF SAFE FROM IDENTITY THEFT

1. DO NOT give out personal information on the telephone, in the mail or on the internet unless you are *absolutely* sure who you are dealing with.
2. DO NOT give our your SIN number. Keep your SIN card in a safe place.
3. SHRED all personal information , receipts, credit card applications, and insurance forms.
4. GUARD your mail.
5. PUT PASSWORDS on your credit cards . AVOID using easily available information like your mother's maiden name, your birth date, your SIN number or telephone numbers.
6. MINIMIZE the identification information and number of cards you carry.
7. ALWAYS keep your bank card in sight!

REMEMBER

Infants face the rear until 20lbs

Toddlers face forward from 20lbs (9kg-18kgs)

Children use booster seats until they are 80lbs, or stand 4'9" (145 cm) tall or turn 8 years old.

Distracted Driving

Driver distraction is a serious issue that encompasses a broad range of distractions. These may take many forms, including; eating, drinking, reading or writing; using a wireless device, grooming, minding children, conversing with passengers, smoking, adjusting in car stereos and electronics and minding pets.

When using your wireless phone on the road, Canada's wireless industry reminds you that your first priority is to **FOCUS ON DRIVING!**



**ONLY YOU CAN MAKE
A DIFFERENCE**

Always buckle up, keep your hands on the wheel and your eyes on the road.

Avoid unnecessary calls.

If you must make or receive a call, advise the person to whom you are speaking that you are driving, if necessary pull over.

Keep conversations brief.

Avoid engaging in stressful or emotional conversations.

Never take notes or use data services such as text messaging, web browsing or e mail.

Allow voice mail to answer a call if conditions are unsafe.

Be A Good Ole Neighbour (Neighbourhood Watch)

A crime prevention program to reduce threats to you and your neighbors property.

What is it?

Simply neighbors watching other neighbors property. A police officer may not recognize a stranger in your yard—but your neighbors would.

How does it Work?

The program works through mutual aid (neighbors watching neighbors).

Neighbors know who you are, and what type of car you own and may be the first to notice a burglar at your window or door.

If you see something suspicious

Write down the description of any suspicious person. Get the make and model, color and license number of strange vehicles. Call the police.

If you are going away

Tell your neighbor:

Where you are going, how to be reached ,when you expect to return, if anybody will be at your home. Leave a key with your neighbor.

CRIME STOPPERS

Crime Stoppers is a non-profit program relying on cooperation between law enforcement agencies, the media, and citizens of our community. The goal of Crime Stoppers is to combat crime by encouraging people to call with information to solve crimes already committed, those about to occur, or whereabouts of a wanted person. Crime Stoppers offers a method to pass information to the police without you ever having to identify yourself. At the same time you may be eligible for a cash reward.

You will never have to testify in court.

WHO IS CRIMESTOPPERS?

Crime Stoppers is NOT a police program! It is managed by a volunteer civilian board of directors who establish policy, raise funds to operate and authorize payment. It is greatly supported by law enforcement agencies who provide police officers to coordinate the program.

1. A crime has been or about to be committed and YOU know something about it.
2. Call CRIMESTOPPERS toll free at 1-800-222-8477 or 519-750-8477 with information about the crime.
3. Your information will be taken in strict confidence. Your anonymity will be protected.
4. You will be issued a confidential code number for use with all future contacts with our CRIME STOPPERS' personnel.
5. You will be asked to call back periodically so you can be updated on your tip or give further information. You will have to refer to your confidential code number.
6. If your tip leads to the successful conclusion of a case, you may be eligible for a cash reward of up to \$2000.
7. Arrangements will be made for you to pick up your reward at a neutral location.
