PRIORITY:

INCREASE FINANCIAL RESOURCES

"Building financial independence to govern on our own terms"

CHIEF'S GOALS:

- RECOVER EXCISE/FUEL/CARBON TAX REVENUES FROM THE GOVERNMENT
- SUPPORT INCREASED "OWN SOURCE" REVENUES

WORK BEING DONE:

Steps Chief Sherri-Lyn Hill actioned and/or undertook include:

- Attended a summit on Bill C-5: One Canadian Economy which was held to inform First Nations on the technical elements of this Bill and to confirm a commitment by Canada to engage in a manner that upholds the Crown's duty to consult and secure Free, Prior and Informed Consent. Chief shared a formal position paper with Prime Minister Carney's office which set our objection to Bill C-5: One Canadian Economy while simultaneously suggesting potential pathways for First Nations to benefit, including revenue generation.
- Met with MP Schmale (critic for the Minister's of Indigenous Services Canada and Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada), along with Councillors Jamieson and Frazer, to raise awareness of the growing infrastructure gap at Six Nations and the need for ways to generate stable revenue sources.

ONGOING COMMITMENT TO CAP POLICY:

The Chief continues to support and uphold Six Nations of the Grand River's Consultation and Accommodation Policy (CAP). CAP is regularly raised in the Chief's meetings with external governments and their proponents to ensure our process is understood and respected. These ongoing efforts support opportunities to increase our own-source revenues through consultation and accommodation in the future.

A TRIAL DATE HAS BEEN SET:

Six Nations Of The Grand River Band Of Indians V. The Attorney General Of Canada And His Majesty The King In Right Of Ontario

A trial date has been set for October 5, 2026, with a judge to be selected in January 2026 for Six Nations of the Grand River's land rights case against Canada and Ontario.

"Actively listening to make our community safer and more accessible"

CHIEF'S GOALS:

- CONTINUE TO LISTEN TO COMMUNITY CONCERNS
- ADVOCATE FOR INCREASED SAFETY MEASURES
- IMPLEMENT A PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM

ONGOING COMMITMENT:

The Six Nations of the Grand River 59th Elected Council continue to focus much effort on community safety and cannabis related concerns. Nia:wen kowa to everyone for your continued patience as we work through this complex and complicated matter.

WORK BEING DONE:

Action Chief Sherri-Lyn Hill undertook or facilitated to support these goals:

- The Chief took some time to visit with our seniors in Delhi, who have been displaced from the Iroquois Lodge due to flooding. Chief continues to advocate for resources to keep our community members safe and together.
- Advocated, with the support of Councillors Jamieson and Frazer, for increased Indigenous-specific transportation funding streams to support the development and implementation of Six Nations of the Grand River's five-phase community transportation plan. The Ontario Minister of Transportation, Prabmeet Singh Sarkaria, shared that he looks forward to working together to strengthen and expand safe and reliable transportation infrastructure across Ontario.

ACCOUNTABILITY TO COMMUNITY

"Improving our effectiveness by enhancing transparency"

CHIEF'S GOALS:

- STRATEGIC PLANNING
- DEVELOP SYSTEMS & PROCESSES TO SUPPORT DECISION MAKING
- KEEP COMMUNITY INFORMED

WORK BEING DONE:

Work led by Chief Sherri-Lyn Hill with support from Six Nations of the Grand River 59th Elected Council (SNGREC and Administration:

- New tracking sheets developed for the Six Nations/Hydro One Network Inc. working group, Bill C-2: Strong Borders Act, and Bill 5: Protect Ontario by Unleashing our Economy Act. These tracking tools are designed to support the current and future elected councils with information that was used to inform decisions made by the SNGREC (and subsequent motions) made on various matters.
- Continue to develop and update "process notes" for the Chief's Office. These notes support consistent and timely responses to matters that are within the political scope of the Chief's responsibilities.
- Facilitated the development and delivery of the Chief and Council Radio Show which aims to provide important updates to community. Nia:wen kowa to the following Councillors Greg Frazer, Dean Hill, and Lesley Greene who participated in recording the Radio Show this quarter.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

The SNGREC, with support from Dable Advisory & Consulting Services, developing a five-year strategic plan (which is complementary to the Six Nations Community Plan). The strategic plan will help inform and guide the work of SNGREC, political committees, and staff for the next five years and beyond. SNGREC looks forward to completing this work. - ENSURE FACILITIES MEET COMMUNITY NEED

UPDATES:

Chief Sherri-Lyn Hill made two visits to the Iroquois Lodge residents staying in Delhi to check in and hear directly from them about how they are doing.

Six Nations of the Grand River Elected Council (SNGREC) continues to be fully engaged with the Ministry of Long-Term Care to speed up the timeline for a new build of the Iroquois Lodge Long-Term Care Home. Keep an eye on our website, SNGR social media, and listen to our Radio Show as SNGR's Emergency Control Group (ECG) has committed to providing timely updates to the community.

WORK BEING DONE:

Steps Chief Sherri-Lyn Hill undertook to support the achievement of these goals:

- Requested a meeting with the Ontario Ministry of Health and Deputy Premier, Sylvia Jones, to discuss Six Nations of the Grand River's health priorities as our request to meet Minister Jones at the 2025 Association of Municipalities of Ontario was not granted.
- Met with MP Larry Brock to share the needs of Six Nations of the Grand River and to secure his on-going support and advocacy.
- The Chief's Office continues to correspond and follow up with the staff of the Minister of Indigenous Services Canada, Mandy Gull-Masty on Six Nations matters of concern, including the state of emergency and growing infrastructure needs. It's hoped that the Minister will come to the territory to witness the devastating conditions of our facilities.



PRIORITY:

PROTECT THE ENVIRONMENT

"Sustaining gifts from the Creator and Mother Earth"

CHIEF'S GOALS:

- STOP ILLEGAL SOIL DUMPING
- PROTECT SIX NATIONS INTERESTS

MAJOR ACHIEVEMENT:

In the last newsletter, we shared the start of municipal engagements along the Haldimand Tract. Since then, meetings have now been conducted with Dufferin County (including Grand Valley, Melancthon, Amaranth, and East Garafraxa – alongside earlier sessions.)

- Work is underway to arrange the next 6 meetings, continuing down the Grand River.
- A further 16 municipalities remain, ensuring that Chief meets with every community along the Haldimand Tract – from the Grand River's mouth to source.

WORK BEING DONE:

Work that Chief Sherri-Lyn Hill has undertaken and/or actioned:

- Met with Englobe, a company that is working on the Phase I and II Environmental Site Assessments for the Glebe Farm property.
- Completed a follow-up with Minister Rickford, Indigenous Affairs and First Nations Economic Reconciliation (IAFNER) on a multi-ministry meeting to address illegal soil dumping on the territory as Chief was unable to secure a delegation meeting with the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) at the 2025 Association of Municipalities of Ontario Conference.
- Facilitated introductions between senior leadership and the Ontario Clean Water Agency. Together they will explore opportunities to address our wastewater issues and needs.
- Met with the Green, New Democratic, and Liberal Parties to inform and seek their support and resolution of long-standing Six Nations matters.

BUILD ALLIES AND POSITIVE RELATIONSHIPS

"We are stronger in numbers"

CHIEF'S GOALS:

- BUILD POSITIVE RELATIONSHIPS
- INCREASE AWARENESS OF SIX NATIONS & OUR SHARED HISTORY

WORK BEING DONE:

Steps actioned and/or undertaken by Chief Sherri-Lyn Hill:

- Met with Child and Family Services of Grand Erie with a goal to maintain a relationship with Six Nations; there is a Six Nations of the Grand River 59th Elected Council (SNGREC) representative at the Board level.
- Met with DriveTest as their goal is to improve access to driver's license testing in First Nation communities. Watch for more details from a community agency.
- Continues to work in partnership with Iroquois Caucus leadership in support of our mutual interests.
- Welcomed the new Grand Chief of the Wendat Nation, Pierre Picard, to Six Nations to continue to build our nation-to-nation relationship and discuss opportunities for working together.
- Continued discussions with the Toronto Mayor, Olivia Chow, on strengthening ties and reviewing shared priorities.
- Held an introductory meeting with Wilfrid Laurier University, who shared their commitment to reconciliation work and partnership opportunities.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

With hard work and strong Six Nations of the Grand River community support, SNGREC and staff hosted the Manitoba evacuees from Pukatawagan and Testakweyak Cree Nations in our Haudenosaunee style. Our guests enjoyed traditional dancing, singing, a delicious lunch, and were invited to take items that were generously donated by community members.

Additionally, in partnership with Six Nations Polytechnic STEAM Academy, a graduation ceremony was held for their high school graduates!

WORK BEING DONE:

Work undertaken:

- Chief Sherri-Lyn Hill attended and/or delivered welcoming words at the following events to support our community:

- Contributed towards the development of the Six Nations of the Grand River 59th Elected Council's strategic plan by participating in workshops, planning meetings, and requests for input and feedback.

- Continue to facilitate a working group with Hydro One Networks Inc. in support of resolving Hydro One related matters.

UPHOLD MEMBERS' BORDER CROSSING RIGHTS

"Making sure you can return to Canada without hassles"

CHIEF'S GOALS:

- RESPOND TO MEMBER CONCERNS ABOUT BORDER ISSUES
- ADVOCATE FOR OUR BORDER CROSSING RIGHTS

STAYING INFORMED ON CROSS-BORDER ISSUES:

Chief Sherri-Lyn Hill attended a Chiefs of Ontario roundtable hosted by the Ontario Regional Chief with the United States Consulate on September 26th. The discussion focused on cross-border cooperation and advancing economic opportunities for First Nations. As Six Nations of the Grand River is unaffiliated with the Chiefs of Ontario, Chief Hill attended to stay informed on issues that directly impact the community.

WORK BEING DONE:

The work being done by Chief's Office:

- Facilitated a technical briefing on Bill C-2: Strong Borders Act, which if passed will amend several pieces of existing legislation including the Customs Act, the Criminal Code, and the Mutual Legal Assistance in Criminal Matters Act. The technical briefing helped affirm the Six Nations of the Grand River 59th Elected Council's position that, "Bill C-2 risks undermining Six Nations' inherent and treaty rights and cannot advance without meaningful consultation and explicit protections for those rights".
- Continue to monitor the work of the Jay Treaty Border Alliance (JTBA). "The JTBA was formed in 2017 by tribal governments and First Nations communities to collaborate on our efforts to protect our rights preserved in the Jay Treaty". JTBA is supporting a new US bill (H.R. 4596, the McCarran-Walter Technical Corrections Act – formerly the Tribal Border Crossing Parity Act), that seeks to remove the 50% blood quantum requirement in Section 289 of the United States Immigration and Nationality Act. The legislation seeks to restore the original intent of the Jay Treaty which affirmed our inherent right to freely cross the US-Canada border.

More updates regarding the Jay Treaty Border Alliance will be shared as they become available.



PRIORITY:

ADVOCATE FOR OUR COLLECTIVE RIGHTS

"The Status Quo is unacceptable"

CHIEF'S GOALS:

- OPPOSE FALSE CLAIMS (LAND, IDENTITY)
- ADVOCATE FOR CLEAN DRINKING WATER FOR OUR COMMUNITY

MONITORING FEDERAL & PROVINCIAL BILLS:

- The volume of provincial and federal legislation being introduced and passed, at a rapid pace, is keeping the Chief and her office very busy.
- Special attention has been given to Ontario's Bill 5 and Canada's Bills C-2 and C-5, among others, as these could have important implications for our community.
- Six Nations of the Grand River 59th Elected Council (SNGREC) continues to review legislation, take positions where needed, and advocate through the legislative process to ensure our rights and interests are protected.

WORK BEING DONE:

- Work Chief Sherri-Lyn Hill took to advance this work:
- Continue to advocate for clean drinking water. Met with the SNGREC legal team regarding next steps in our litigation against Canada over Drinking Water (claim filed in November 2024 in Hamilton).
 - Continue to create and build awareness of the Nanfan territory, Haldimand Tract, and Six Nations' land claim against Canada and Ontario with Ontario's municipal leadership. This work helps to create awareness of our shared history.
 - Continue to oppose false Métis Rights assertions on behalf of the SNGREC.

WORK BEING DONE:

Steps Chief Sherri-Lyn Hill undertook include:

- Participated in on-site walk throughs of the Gané Yohs Medical Centre (closed since April 2024 due to mold) and the Iroquois Lodge (closed in June 2025 due to flooding) to gain a clear and fulsome understanding of the state of these facilities.
- Continue to support the work of the Emergency Control Group (ECG) with ongoing local, provincial, and national advocacy efforts on the state of emergency and Six Nations’ growing infrastructure needs.
- Completed outreach to Niagara Region leadership and Indigenous Services Ontario region by connecting representatives of Pukatawagan First Nation with the Niagara Falls public and catholic school boards with the goal of securing enrolment for hundreds of elementary school students who were evacuated due to the wildfires and continue to be housed in Niagara Falls hotels.

SIX NATIONS OF THE GRAND RIVER ONTARIO WORKS

The Six Nations of the Grand River (SNGR) Ontario Works department provides support to individuals in temporary financial need by helping them find sustainable employment and achieve self-reliance through the provision of effective, integrated employment services and financial assistance.

The department works with clients to become self-sufficient and financially independent of the program. The primary objective of Ontario Works is to provide clients with employment and training support services that lead to long-term financial independence.

Please note: The eligibility requirements are subject to Ontario Works directives. Participation is a mandatory requirement for eligibility.

LOOKING FORWARD

The SNGR Ontario Works department will continue to advocate for a social assistance system that recognizes the needs and challenges of the Six Nations community. This will require advocating for change and/or improvements with representatives of the Ontario government.

The department will also deliver services recognizing the voice of the people, as per the SNGR Community Plan.

HOW THEY SERVE THE COMMUNITY

SUCCESS STORIES:

New direct deposit method and upgraded system changes

Successfully planned and implemented a direct deposit method of processing client payments. This change has replaced a long-standing system of coming into the office to pick up cheques. Successfully transitioning to the new software system, AD Morrison.

Easing financial hardships

Distributed additional funds received from Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) to help ease financial hardships. The funds provided support to lower income individuals and families.

Enhancing employability

Case managers have successfully provided many clients with providing financial supports to enhance their employability, such as, tuition fees, employment start-up costs, and supports to remove employment barriers.

Weekly client workshops

Successfully planned/coordinated weekly client workshops. The goal of these workshops is to enhance a client's knowledge and skills that will lead to independence. SNGR Ontario Works has also provided clients with transportation services to participate in these workshops.
